Conference Speakers Focusing on Higher Functioning ASD

"After receiving my B.S. in psychology from the University of Pittsburgh, I began my professional career working at the Autism Center located at Children's Hospital of Pittsburgh. After several years of assisting with research and working with individuals with Autism Spectrum Disorders (ASD) in both clinical and summer camp settings, I enrolled in the School Psychology Program at the University of South Florida. There, I received my Ph.D. in School Psychology with an emphasis in pediatric health issues. Prior to joining the faculty at Kent State University, I worked as a school psychologist and autism consultant for the District School Board of Pasco County in West Central Florida. While working as a school psychologist, I provided coaching and technical assistance for inclusion practices for children with ASD, behavioral disorders, and other severe and low-incidence disabilities. As an applied school psychologist and researcher, I focus on the use of a problem-solving model that takes a contextual/systems approach for the identification of and program planning for children with disabilities. Currently, my research and professional interests include the development and implementation of behavioral and social skills interventions for young children with ASD and for individuals with severe and low-incidence developmental disabilities, behavior management, data-based service delivery systems, and systemic educational reform (i.e. Response to Intervention).

Dr. Sansosti will be Thursday's featured speaker. His presentations at the conference will assist practitioners in learning to:

- Identify characteristics of higher functioning ASD that may affect school performance and how to implement effective teaching practices to accommodate these students.
- Incorporate strategies that support the development of behavioral skills in school-based settings.
- Incorporate strategies for social skills programming in structured & unstructured activities at school.
- Interact with families and educational team members in responsive and defendable ways.

As usual, the summer went by quickly, but that doesn't surprise me anymore. After all, summer is only a few weeks long. When I close up shop in June, I always have this grand illusion that August is some far off time. I guess it's more like denial than illusion.


I have been back to work full time for more than three weeks now. I have organized as much of my schedule and caseloads as I can . It's kind of like preparing a pack for a long cross country hike. There's only so much space in the calendar (backpack) and it seems hardly possible that everything will fit. I have decided to try out a concept called auto-pilot scheduling. It's really nothing too technical, but just a way to cause more things to happen in a timely manner. As I have begun to use it, I am thinking that maybe it is a psychological way of convincing myself that the tasks on my list will and must fit into the schedule of my week. I have a tendency to be a helper kind of person and find myself doing things for others that then causes my work hours to bulge and spill over into family time; sometimes it's not just spilling, but actually flooding. So, I am starting out the year with a plan. Auto-pilot scheduling is something I read about in a blog called Study Hacks. The writer of the blog basically studies how to study. I enjoy his dissatisfaction with the status quo.

My goal for this year is to spend a little time every week reviewing new research in the area of autism spectrum disorders. I just need to figure out how I want to organize my review, because there are so many aspects of the disability to consider.

Dr. Herbert, author of <u>The Autism Revolution</u> (see sidebar), included a dozen tips from Brenda Smith Myles, an autism researcher and educator, for "doing an end run around behavior problems."

- 1. Don't rush. You need to operate on autism time rather than expecting your child to act on yours.
- 2. Take more time to do fewer things. A rough rule of thumb is that people with autism take twice the time to accomplish half as much.
- 3. Provide structure and spell out routines through pictures, stories, or other reinforcement.
- 4. Take frequent breaks. Leave time for relaxation.
- 5. Anticipate physical needs, such as bathroom and eating breaks, and provide for them ahead of time.
- 6. Have a clear plan and routine, but be ready to change it and help the child with the change. Offer structured predictability.
- 7. Teach calming skills.
- 8. Respect your child's interests and abilities and give them space.
- 9. Praise your child abundantly.
- 10. "Live out loud"—narrate what you are doing and why you are doing it, and problem-solve out loud, too.
- 11. Use daily activities and events to teach basic information that your child may not learn spontaneously.
- 12. Don't forget to laugh! Having fun with your child is the best revenge you can take against whatever got you in this position in the first place.



Book Review

"The autism world is filled with different groups that often disagree with one another. But they all make important points...Most of what I offer here are strategies I think everyone can get behind. They're safe, relatively simple, and often effective. Systems science supports my belief that small adjustments can sometimes trigger big changes. My goal is to offer parents, caregivers, and adults facing autism themselves some new ways of thinking about what they do every day and how the parts interact." ~ excerpted from the book The Autism Revolution, published in 2012 by Harvard University.

The Autism Revolution was written by Martha Herbert, MD, PhD, assistant professor of neurology at Harvard Medical School and a pediatric neurologist at Massachusetts General Hospital, where she is the director of the TRANSCEND Research Program. She sits on the Scientific Advisory Committee for Autism Speaks.

Dr. Herbert looks at autism as a set of symptoms and works to help the reader sort out possible sources of stress, both biological and contextual, then gives ideas for intervening. The book provides a good review of brain biology and cell functioning. Dr. Herbert tells many individual stories of successful intervention, but also cautions that what works for one person may not be the key to another's success.

SPAN/GPR: Opportunities for Advocacy

have often heard it asked, "What does SPAN stand for?" or "What is GPR?" You too may have wondered this. The SPAN (School Psychology Action Network) and GPR (Government and Professional Relations) Committee for SDASP (oh, we school psychologists love our acronyms) works to advocate on behalf of students, educators, and school psychologists in South Dakota.

In an era of little funding and a lot of accountability, NASP assists states by providing a roadmap for advocacy. In March 2010, NASP adopted the Model for Comprehensive and Integrated Psychological Services (a.k.a. the NASP Practice Model). This document aims to provide states a format for improving the quality, effectiveness and efficiency, as well as consistency, of school psychological services across the country. It describes six organizational principles and ten domains of practice that are intended to improve outcomes for students and schools. Each of these can be found in the NASP Practice Model Overview, which can be found on-line at:

These guidelines can serve each South Dakota School Psychologist by improving their practice individually, but can also provide other stakeholders a framework for understanding the roles and responsibilities of school psychologists. The SPAN/GPR committee currently engages in the following activities to advocate for our profession: annual attendance at Children's Day at the Capital and response to relevant legislation affecting the profession. But as the saying goes, an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure. The SPAN/GPR committee and the SDASP board hopes to improve advocacy efforts in South Dakota by using the Advocacy Roadmap (which integrates the NASP Practice Model, Standards for Graduate Preparation of School Psychologists,

Standards for the Credentialing of School Psychologists, and the Principles for Professional Ethics) to define contemporary school psychology, promote school psychologists' services for children, families and school, and provide a foundation for the future of school psychology.

Rapid City Area Schools has revamped the Response to Intervention process used in the district. One essential component of the process has been the establishment of decision points in order to create consistency across the district in determining who is in need of Tier 2 interventions. The district has also identified specific tools for measuring progress.

Bridget Henrikson has been hired as a half-time school psychologist in Rapid City. Bridget was previously employed in Colorado as a school psychologist. She has experience in the Response to Intervention process and development of behavioral

intervention plans. Erin Alsum will also be working in the district as an intern. Keyra Comer has returned to the Rapid City Area Schools serving as a school psychologist after working as a special education director in Spearfish the last few years. Sonja Shannon, who retired a year ago, has been contracting through the state as a mediator to assist in increasing communication between families and schools.

This past summer, Curtis Middleton, West Area Representative, and Sarah Hohn, special education teacher, provided swimming and sports exploration activities for children with autism spectrum disorders. Three age groups participated including a group for children 5-9, another group for children 10-14, and also an adult group. Curtis met with parents at the end of the session to discuss each child's skill development and possible opportunities for further involvement in sports activities.
