FOSTERING ACADEMIC, BEHAVIORAL, AND SOCIAL FUNCTIONING IN STUDENTS WITH HIGHER FUNCTIONING AUTISM SPECTRUM DISORDERS

Video modeling is a strategy that involves watching a video of a model (or self) engaging in a target behavior. This strategy has



been shown to be more effective than live modeling with quicker acquisition and increased generalization for children with autism spectrum disorders. What's more, it is cost and time efficient. This was just one of the topics introduced by Dr. Frank Sansosti, Ph. D., at the fall conference held September 20 and 21 in Chamberlain, South Dakota.

The **DSM, 5th Edition,**is coming and is
anticipated to be here
by this summer!
Dr. Sansosti covered
the changes for the
PDD category
as follows:

"...the [proposed] revised criteria include only two symptom domains (social-communication and fixated, repetitive interests), eliminate subtypes of ASD, and describe individual differences in terms of dimensions of severity in the two domains, relative to developmental levels and chronological age. Thus, an individual with an ASD diagnosis would be described in terms of severity of social communication symptoms and severity of fixated or restricted behaviors or interests..."

The DSM-V will now include a Social Communication Disorder for individuals who have difficulty with social communication both verbal and nonverbal communication. Implications include: limited social ability; difficulty engaging with peers; difficulty maintaining conversation; and lack of perspective taking.

IDEA will have the option to make changes to autism eligibility standards or maintain current criteria.

Professor and Coordinator of the School Psychology Program at Kent State University, stated that a meta-analysis synthesized findings from 23 studies on the use of video modeling. Overall, results indicate video modeling is an EFFECTIVE intervention for social skills, behavior, language, functional skills, and academic skills. Results were EFFECTIVE across all levels of the spectrum. The most effective video models are less than three minutes and depict positive behaviors. This intervention has resulted in a large effect size in studies and has met the criteria for designation as an evidence-based practice.

During Dr. Pansosti's day long presentation, conference attendees were given information on the following topics: characteristics; impact on education; assessment considerations; how students with HFA/AS facilitate knowledge; promoting school success; fostering academic development; effective behavioral support; and multi-tiered systemic social skills support. A recommended resource is *High-Functioning Autism/ Asperger Syndrome in Schools: Assessment and Intervention* by Frank Sansosti, Kelly Powell-Smith, and Richard Cowan.

ASPERGER'S AND COMORBID DISORDERS

On Friday of the conference, Dr. Scott Schneider spoke about Asperger's and comorbid disorders. Dr. Schneider, MD, from Avera



Medical Group, Midwest Psychiatric Medicine, provided information about Asperger's from a historical and medical perspective. He shared statistics that indicate some genetic mechanisms and changes in gene expressions. Advanced paternal and maternal age is associated with relative increased risk. Secondary causes of autism spectrum symptoms such

as Fragile-X, Neurocutaneous Disorders, and Rett's Syndrome, are rare (6% in a recent study). Children with ASDs have a difference in brain growth and development which is likely to have begun prenatally. Brains start out average to below average in size, but become macrocephalic in the first year. In most people, "side roads die off and the interstate gets bigger, but in children with (Continued on page 7)

ASD, the die-off doesn't occur." Mirror cells exist in the brain. In layman's terms, mirror cells are when a cell that looks at something is right next to a cell that would do the behavior. In autism, mirror cells over or under fire. The preparatory cells are not working. Based on research, medications prescribed for autism are not causing harm, but provide neuro-protective functioning. Brain deterioration can occur without needed medication.

Asperger's is comorbid with depression (41%), anxiety (8%), schizophrenia (9%), suicide attempts (7%). **Autism** is comorbid with phobias (44%), OCD (37%), ADHD (44%), depression (10%).

Differences Between Asperger's and High Functioning Autism noted by Dr. Schneider

Individuals with Asperger's improve over time; those with High Functioning Autism not as much. The latter improve until their mid-30s and then may plateau or regress, a result that is directly related to when society pulls away educational and psychiatric services.

"Children with autism carry around the train. Children with Asperger's know the train schedule."

Individuals with Asperger's outperform those with High Functioning Autism on ability tests.
